MOBILE BLOOD SERVICE VISITS COLEAMBALLY

The Australian Red Cross Blood Service made regular visits to Coleambally in 2017.

WATER QUALITY UPDATE

Council continues to make water quality at Darlington Point a priority.

Council carried out maintenance work on Bore Number 1 at Darlington Point recently, while a suitably qualified consultant has now been secured.

Work on Bore Number 1 included cleaning and assessment using cameras.

Meanwhile Bore Number 2 at Darlington Point has also been cleaned and treated to enable it to be in use while Bore Number 1's pump is being serviced.

Council continues to monitor chlorine levels and has negotiated consultant services with NSW Health Department.

The work, including regular sampling, will be ongoing.

A gas chlorination injection system is planned for installation at the earliest possible opportunity following system review by the consultants.

Council is complying with the best practice guidelines at all times and will continue to provide regular updates to the community on the progress made.

Recent sample results indicate Total Chlorine 0.99 mg/L and Free Chlorine 0.64 mg/L.

NSW Health Department accredited consultant Adam Wilson from Atom Consulting commenced work on the assessment of the Darlington Point water supply on Monday 11 December. Council is looking forward to his assessment report and recommendations so that immediate action can be taken.

COLEAMBALLY STREETSCAPE MASTER PLAN

Council recently appointed Red Belly Landscape Architecture to create the Draft Master Plan for the Coleambally Town Centre Revitalisation Project.

The redesign of the town centre streetscape is being led by Murrumbidgee Council, in collaboration with the Coleambally Chamber of Commerce and Industry Inc.

Representatives from Council, Coleambally Chamber of Commerce and other community members met with project architect Garry Murray recently, allowing him to develop a better understanding of the community's views and ideas.

The main aim of this Master Plan is to guide the town centre improvement works to enhance and future proof the town centre as the economic, social and cultural hub of the Coleambally Township.

The focus area of the Draft Master Plan encompasses land generally contained within Brolga Place and Kingfisher Avenue, with the proposed Sporting Precinct also being considered.

Preliminary concept ideas for the Plan will be discussed in mid-December and a draft will be submitted to the February Council meeting.

FUNDING INJECTION FOR McDONALD ROAD

Murrumbidgee Council has received support with funding of \$1,642,015 from the NSW Government towards the \$1.85 million cost of carrying out a much needed upgrade of McDonald Road, near Coleambally.

This investment will significantly reduce costs to business and industry, while driving economic growth and improving safety along this important link road," Member for Albury, Greg Aplin said.

"Economic growth in rural areas relies on agricultural commodities, industrial products and natural resources being able to move to market efficiently."

This project will see the road between Graham Road intersection and Morundah Road widened to 9m and sealed to a width of 7m, to match with existing sealed sections. Murrumbidgee Council is contributing \$212,000 towards the cost.

STRONGER COMMUNITIES FUND

Council is s step closer to earmarking funds in the third and final stage of the Stronger Community Fund (SCF), after the Assessment Panel met in Jerilderie on 29 November to consider the major project applications.

The Stronger Community Fund (SCF) comprises three funding streams.

The first stream is \$5 million available to the Council to fund the work required to merge the two former Councils. Any unspent funds within this component of the SCF will be transferred to either of the other streams, the Community Grants Program (CGP) or the Major Project Fund (MPF).

The second stream, the CGP, comprises \$1.5m in funding for not -for-profit community organisations for grants of up to \$50,000. This stream was run via two rounds of funding.

In November 2016 Council announced the recipients of Round One grants totalling \$1.014m to 33 organisations within the Council area. In May 2017 Council announced the recipients of Round Two grants totalling \$518,995 to 24 organisations.

Projects funded in Rounds One and Two of the CGP are at various stages ranging from projects which have been completed to projects that are yet to commence.

Since the Round One and Two grants were announced, staff and Councillors have been working in conjunction with those organisations to deliver the funded projects.

Further updates on the third and final stream, the Major Projects Fund (MPF), will be provided in February 2018.
